#### STUDENTS ARE ASKED TO MAKE A PAPER NAME PLAQUE FOR THEIR DESK.

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BE IT ENACTED BY THE CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED THAT:

- SECTION 1. An additional federal sales tax of 5% shall be levied on all ultra-processed foods sold within the United States. The revenue generated from this tax shall be allocated to the United States Department of Agriculture (USDA) to expand nutritional education programs and promote healthier food options in schools.
- **SECTION 2**. For this legislation, "ultra-processed foods" shall be defined as foods that contain any of the following:
  - A. More than 10% of calories from added sugars like high-fructose corn syrup;
  - B. Artificial additives or preservatives not essential for safety or preservation;
  - C. Ingredients that have undergone chemical modification beyond simple processing methods like freezing, fermenting, or canning.
- SECTION 3. To support American farmers in transitioning toward healthier food production and to offset any economic impact, \$80 million for small subsidies to farmers will be redirected from the Department of Defense budget to the USDA budget. The USDA will determine the exact size and distribution of these subsidies based on the specific needs and costs of promoting sustainable and healthier crop options.
- **SECTION 4.** This bill will be implemented July 1, 2025.

**SECTION 5.** All laws in conflict with this legislation are hereby declared null and void. Introduced for Congressional Debate by Iowa City West High School

### A Bill To Nationalize College Board

BE IT ENACTED BY THE STUDENT CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED THAT:

Section 1 The United States Government shall nationalize the College Board.

Section 2 College Board refers to the non-profit organization that provides students with learning opportunities such as AP programs, SAT Suite, BigFuture, and more.

This piece of legislation will over rule Prohibiting Nationalization of American Companies and Investments Act of 2023

Section 3 The Department of Education shall oversee the implementation of this piece of legislation.

- College Board will be absorbed by the Department of Education, and the DOE will assume control from the current board of trustees.
- All costs of programs controlled by College Board such as AP exams or SATs will now be free to all students.
- c. The Department of Education can administer changes to accessibility, materials and course content for all College Board programs.
- Section 4 This piece of legislation will be implemented on the 1st of June, 2026.

Section 5 All laws in conflict are hereby declared null and void.

### A Bill to Abolish Corporal Punishment

BE IT ENACTED BY THE CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED THAT:

1 <b>SEC</b>	<b>CTION 1:</b> The state shall abolish all acts of Corporal Punishment to prevent acts of
2 dom	estic violence.
3	A. Corporal Punishment is defined by the American Academy of Child &
4	Adolescent Psychiatry as a discipline method in which a supervising adult
5	deliberately inflicts pain upon a child in response to a child's unacceptable
6	behavior.
7	a. Corporal Punishment is actual physical contact.
8 SEC	<b>CTION 2:</b> The United States Department of Justice will oversee implementation
9	A. A first offense qualifies as a simple misdemeanor. The offender can face up to 30
10	days in jail and a fine ranging from \$105 to \$855.
11	B. Punishments resulting in bodily injury qualify as a serious misdemeanor. Penalties
12	include one year in jail and a fine between \$430 and \$2,560.
13	C. Use of or displaying a weapon, resulting in serious injury, escalates to aggravated
14	misdemeanor. Carries up to two years in prison and fines of \$855 to \$8,540.
16	D. Repeated offenses or severe assaults are classified as a Class D felony. This
17	results in five years in prison and fines ranging from \$1,025 to \$10,245.
18	E. Extreme harm or repeated violations, raise to a Class C felony. Resulting in ten
19	years in prison and fines from \$1,370 to \$13,660.
20 SE	CTION 3: This legislation will take effect on June, 1 2025. All laws in
21	conflict with this legislation are hereby declared null and void.

### A Bill to Ensure the Right of Digital Privacy

BE IT ENACTED BY THE CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED THAT:

1	SECTION 1.	A person's digital footprint of any kind is considered the private property		
2		of that person. Any business will be required to have opt-in consent to		
3		transfer data regarding said person to a third party.		
4	SECTION 2.	Digital footprint can be defined as the record of data about a particular		
5		person that exists as a result of online activity.		
6	<b>SECTION 3.</b> Opt-in consent can be defined as an individual providing consent outsid			
7		of the Terms of Service (commonly referred to as Terms and Conditions,		
8		Terms of Use, Conditions of Use, or User Agreement).		
9	SECTION 4.	The Federal Trade Commission (FTC) will be responsible for the		
10		enforcement of this legislation.		
11		A. Any business found in violation of Section 1 will be fined a minimum of		
12		\$50,000 per violation.		
13	SECTION 5.	This legislation will take effect on January 1, 2026.		
14	SECTION 6.	All laws in conflict with this legislation are hereby declared null and void.

### A Bill to Increase Funding For Military Drones

BE IT ENACTED BY THE CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED THAT:

1 SECTION 1. The United States Military will increase funding towards research, development,

acquisition, and training of unmanned warfare systems and countermeasures
against such systems. The focus of the systems will specifically be for

4 peer/near-peer conflict applications.

- 5 SECTION 2. Unmanned warfare systems are defined as any vehicle, weapon, or other device
   that allows an operator to provide input/control the system from a distance while
- 7 providing feedback to the operator, such as an UAV (unmanned aerial vehicle,
- 8 more commonly referred to as a 'drone'). Countermeasures are defined as
- 9 anything used to eliminate, incapacitate, protect against, or otherwise lessen the 10 effectiveness of unmanned warfare systems, such as anti-UAV electronic warfare.
- 11 Peer/Near-Peer Conflict is defined as military conflict with a nation possessing
- 12 regular armed forces with similar capabilities to that of the U.S. or its allies.
- 13 SECTION 3. The Department of Defense will be allocated \$15,000,000,000 for strengthening
   unmanned warfare capability.

15 SECTION 4. This legislation will take effect on FY 2025. All laws in conflict with this legislationare hereby declared null and void.

#### A Bill to Prohibit the Censorship of Books in Public Schools

#### 1 BE IT ENACTED BY THE CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED THAT

2 SECTION 1. This is to eliminate the censorship of diverse literature in public school libraries

3 and classrooms and to ensure that we are promoting critical thinking, cultural awareness,

4 and academic freedom among students.

#### 5 SECTION 2. Definitions

- 6 A. <u>Censorship</u>: The suppression or prohibition of books, materials, or ideas deemed
- 7 inappropriate or controversial.
- 8 B. Literature: Any written work, including novels, non-fiction, poetry, and other forms of
- 9 media that contribute to the educational curriculum.
- 10 C. Public School: Any educational institution that is funded and operated by local, state,
- 11 or federal government.

#### 12 SECTION 3: Requirements

- 13 A. No public school shall ban or restrict access to books based on content, themes, or
- 14 authorship.
- 15 B. Book challenges must be handled through a transparent review process that includes
- 16 input from educators, parents, and students, ensuring diverse viewpoints are
- 17 considered.

#### 18 SECTION 4: Review Process

- 19 A. Any challenge to a book must be submitted in writing to the school board and will be
- 20 reviewed by a committee comprised of: librarians, teachers, parents, student
- 21 representatives, and community members.
- 22 The committee will evaluate the book based on its educational value, literary merit, and
- 23 relevance to the curriculum.

24 SECTION 6: Schools found in violation of this act shall be required to restore access to

25 banned materials and undergo training on intellectual freedom and cultural diversity.

26 Violation reports may be submitted to the state education department for investigation.

27 SECTION 7: This act shall take effect on January 1st 2025.

### **Agriculture Subsidies Reduction Act**

BE IT ENACTED BY THE CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED THAT:

1 SECTION 1 2	. The United States shall implement a phased reduction of agriculture subsidies by 10% per year, redirecting the funds to research and
3	development within the agriculture sector.
4 SECTION 2.	. "Agriculture subsidies" refer to government financial assistance programs that support farmers and agribusinesses, including direct payments, crop
6	insurance, and price support. "Research and development" relates to
7	genetic modification and editing, and other applications aimed at
8 9 SECTION 3	improving crop yields, pest resistance, and environmental sustainability. The United States Department of Agriculture shall oversee the
10	implementation and compliance of this subsidy reduction and fund
11	reallocation.
12	A. The USDA shall reduce agriculture subsidies by 10% annually.
13 14	B. The USDA shall assemble a task force which aims to redirect funds to a wide variety of R&D projects.
15 <b>SECTION 4</b> 16	• This legislation will take effect beginning in FY 2028. All laws in conflict with this legislation are hereby declared null and void.

# A BILL TO REQUIRE YEAR ROUND SCHOOL YEAR IN THE STATE OF IOWA

#### By Norwalk High School

#### BE IT ENACTED BY THE IHSSA STUDENT CONGRESS:

1 Section 1: All public and nonpublic school districts in the state of Iowa shall operate on a year

2 round school district calendar for kindergarten through twelfth grade.

3 Section 2: The school calendar shall include not less than one hundred eighty days or one

4 thousand eighty hours of instruction during the calendar year, of which not more than five days or 5 thirty hours of instruction may be delivered primarily over the internet.

6 Section 3: School districts shall provide at least ten days of instruction or the hourly equivalent

7 during eleven of the twelve months of the school year. The period of time between instructional

8 days shall not exceed four weeks.

9 Section 4: The school year for each school district and accredited nonpublic school shall begin on 10 July 1.

11 **Section 5:** All public and nonpublic school districts shall take a mandatory two week break from 12 the first Monday before the Iowa State Fair to the first Monday after the Iowa State Fair.

13 Section 6: The board of directors of a school district and the authorities in charge of an

14 accredited nonpublic schools shall determine instructional breaks for the school year and shall set 15 the number of days or hours of required attendance for the school year as provided but the board 16 of directors of a school district shall hold a public hearing on any proposed school calendar prior 17 to adopting the school calendar.

18 Section 8: This act is effective July 1, 2026.

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### A Bill to Fund School Renovations.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED THAT:

1	SECTION 1.	The Department of Education shall allocate \$20 billion to new grants for
2		school districts over the next 10 years. These grants shall be used for the
3		purposes of renovating school buildings to modern standards.
4	SECTION 2.	Renovating shall be defined as reconstruction or additions to buildings or
5		the systems of said building.
6		A. Systems include, but are not limited to internet, heating, cooling,
7		plumbing, and anything the Department of Education deems to be positive
8		to the quality of student education.
9	SECTION 3.	The Department of Education will be responsible for the enforcement of
10		this legislation.
11		A. The Department of Education has full oversight over the usage of these
12		grants by individual districts.
13		B. School districts should be allowed to request these grants by a process
14		decided by the Department of Education.
15	SECTION 4.	This legislation will take effect at the start of the 2027-2028 school year. All
16		laws in conflict with this legislation are hereby declared null and void.

### A Bill to Create Separate Sport Classes for Public and Private Schools

	BE IT ENACTED BY THE CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED THAT:		
1	SECTION 1.	Private and public schools will have separate sports classes.	
2			
3	SECTION 2.	Sports classes are defined by the State of Iowa and the schools BEDS (Basic	
4		Educational Data Survey) numbers. Public Schools are defined by being	
5		supported by government funds and have to be accredited by the state.	
6		Private schools are defined as being supported by tuitions/private	
7		orgaizations/donors and may be accredited by the state.	
8			
9	SECTION 3.	In lowa, private and public schools currently compete in the same sports	
10		classes. This bill would ensure that schools are still placed in classes by the	
11		population of their school, but it would make public schools separate from	
12		private schools using a similar system to the one we have in place (5A, 4A	
13		3A etc.	
14			
15	SECTION 4.	The Department of Education, Iowa High School Athletic Association, and	
16		Iowa Girls Athletic Union will oversee the implementation of this bill.	
17			
18	SECTION 5.	This legislation will take effect on July 1st, 2026. All laws in conflict with this	
19		legislation are hereby declared null and void.

- 10. enforcement centers, court houses and city halls.
- 11. **Section 2:** Any allocation of funds needed will be through the Medicare & Medicaid
- 12. systems.
- 13. Section 3a: If a parent opts out after declaration of death the penalty will be 75 hours of14. community service.
- 15. Section 3b: If a hospital refuses to harvest viable organs the hospital will be
- 16. fined \$15,000 per organ.
- 17. Section 3c: All fine collections will go back into the system of Medicare and
- 18. Medicaid to help pay for organ donations.
- 19. Section 4: Any laws in conflict with this legislation are hereby declared null and void.
- 20. Section 5: This bill will go into effect on July 1st, 2025.

### A Bill to Ban Student Dress Code Policies

BE IT ENACTED BY THE CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED THAT:

1	SECTION 1.	All rules, regulations, and requirements related to the appearance of		
2		students in K-12 schools will be declared illegal, including school uniforms,		
3		clothing bans, clothing length requirements, hairstyles, and any other		
4		requirement about a student's appearance. Clothing and equipment		
5		regulations intended primarily for student's physical safety in class or		
6		extracurricular activities (e.g. requiring goggles in the chemistry lab or		
7		helmets on the football field) will be exempt from this legislation.

12	SECTION 3.	The Department of Education will oversee the enforcement of this		
13		legislation. Any school found in violation of this policy will be fined \$9,000		
14		per violation.		
15	SECTION 4.	This legislation will take effect on August 1st, 2025. All laws in conflict with		
16		this legislation are hereby declared null and void.

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### A BILL TO BAN ONLINE AND MOBILE SPORTS WAGERING IN IOWA

BE IT ENACTED BY THE IHSSA STUDENT CONGRESS:

1 Section 1: Sports wagering shall be limited to licensed casinos, racetracks or sports

2 gambling structures by the Iowa Racing and Gaming Commission.

3 Section 2: Licensed sports wagering corporations shall not conduct sports wagering online or via4 mobile applications with the state of Iowa.

5 Section 3: Sports wagering corporations in violation of sections 1 and 2 of this act shall have their

6 license to operate suspended for one year by the Iowa Racing and Gaming Commission.

7 Section 4: As used in this act, the following definitions apply:

8 (A)"Sports wagering" means the acceptance of wagers on an authorized sporting event or

9 sports-related event by any system of wagering as authorized by the Iowa Racing and

10 Gaming Commission.

11 (B)"Sports wagering online" means a sports wagering company that transmits sports wagers and

12 sports wagering information over telecommunications lines.

13 (C)"Sports wagering mobile application" means a type of software program designed to run

14 sports wagering on a mobile device.

15 (D) "Sports Wagering Corporation" a company that accepts wagers on sporting events

16 Section 5: This act is effective March 1, 2025.

### A Bill to Ban Legacy Admissions at Universities and Colleges

- 13. Any universities and colleges that are found to accept legacy
- 14. admissions will be fined \$250,000 per legacy admission.
- 15. **SECTION 4.** This bill shall go into effect at the beginning of the 2026-2027 academic
- 16. year.
- 17. SECTION 5. All laws in conflict with this legislation are hereby declared null
- 18. and void.

### A Bill to Abolish the Department of Education In Favor of Federalism

- 1 **Section 1**. School can only be held four days a week in the State of Iowa.
- 2 Section 2. The definition of a four day school week will be as follows: School will
